
## Final Conference in the European **Parliament**




#### INTRODUCTION






### From de UK


"HP-MOS had the opportunity to travel with two Women Refugee Women in the UK, who participated in the participatory video workshop. The women had the opportunity to highlight their stories and reminded us of the many examples of women's oppression that are still not properly recognised. They further stated that most of the women asylum seekers have been forced to seek refuge in the UK, most of whom are victims of serious human rights abuses such as trafficking or rape in conflict. These women report that they will continue to campaign for their human rights."

"People maybe know the stories about the men who left Turkey and came to Germany to find a job and a better life... but what about their wives who were left behind in Turkey and followed them years later? This project shows the letters we wrote, the difficulties we had to face, the hardship we had to fight and how difficult was our arrival in Germany!"

"I've learnt that through reflection on identity, organization and self-representation of subjects in audiovisual format we can see forgotten realities".

"I want everyone to see our movie, to see that disability is not inability but a form of diversity that should be understood and respected. But what does diversity mean? We all are so different from one another...."

"This experience is for those, like me, who do not feel they can have a voice and are marginalized in our society. It is always good when you are involved in things in which you feel you have an important role to play".

### From Germany

"When entering the European Parliament you find yourself in a noisy, busy beehive that makes your head spin. People are rushing in and out of hundreds of different rooms, you hear dozens of different tongues within your first 5 minutes in there. You feel suddenly very important and at the same time very unimportant.

We are having a conference here today, our project made it to the European Parliament – and how could we possibly be noticed here among all these important events? Conflicting thoughts. But then, sitting in the conference room and watching our films, listening to the project leaders and participants, all of that is not important anymore.


What matters is that we have all managed to complete what we had set our minds to: we produced six interesting and thought-provoking films, and hopefully we helped at least 80 people to find a way to express their opinions and feelings and to show them to the world."

#### From GREECE

"It was very important for us that the final meeting was held in the European Parliament. It gave us the opportunity to visit this place and meet the people who work there. For us it was also important because we were able to inform Greek members of the Parliament about the project and get support and feedback from them about our action.

Everyone who worked for this final meeting did an excellent job, although it is not easy to guarantee the best possible outcome since it doesn't entirely depend on us. It would be better if we could show the results of the VISTA project also to others but it was important that we all had the final image of the project and that we interacted.

This meeting marked the end of the project. But we believe that it started new collaborations, brought new feedbacks and new perspectives. Now we feel more confident in using this method with our partners and we are looking for other ways to mobilize our community regarding people with disabilities and their daily life."

### From SPAIN

"In the case of PATER, working with long-term unemployed using the Participatory Video has been a social intervention process which has attempted to transform beliefs and expectations of the participants in order to project this transformation to the rest of society. I've learned that through reflection on identity, organization and self-representation of subjects in audiovisual formats we can see realities that are forgotten. Equally or more important than the final product of a PV, is the process carried out.

The difficulties that sometimes the participants were in (lack of motivation, lack of understanding of the negotiation process, philosophical differences and resignation) caused the group to hardly be able to evolve as a whole. However, with the help of PV we managed to overcome this issue. A common goal enhances individual capabilities. Showing the daily life of an unemployed is a raw sample of a daily reality that should not be forgotten by society.

The experiences of each partner working with other collectives of people is similar to ours.

A resulting objective is the recognition by the community that there are still people with strong problems (labour market, disabilities, mobility, migration) which continue to set skewed goals and expectations.


It was intended that through Participatory Video, participants set up their own values of truth, relevance, significance and identity, from an internal perspective, regardless of their status as unemployed, marginalized, abused or disabled."
